The Proudest Blue: A Story of Hijab and Family by Ibtihaj Muhammad with S. K. Ali; illustrated by Hatem Aly (RL: 1.6)

Do you remember how special your first day of a brand-new school year feels? For Faizah, it is a special day to show off her new backpack and light-up shoes. For her older sister Asiyah, it is the first day to show off a new blue hijab. A hijab is a veil worn by women in the Muslim culture, usually covering the head and the chest. "It's the most beautiful first day of school ever...I'm walking with a princess." At school, not everyone views the hijab as beautiful, and Faziah faces hurtful and confusing words about her sister. Will Faziah stay strong and find a way to teach others about a tradition that is so important to her family?

"Ep-sicle! Ep-sicle! Who wants an Ep-sicle?" Wait! What IS an Ep-sicle? Well, on a hot sunny day, it is a favorite treat to eat...can you guess what it is? As a child, Frank Epperson wanted to be an inventor. He spent a lot of time on his back porch (also known as his laboratory), building and experimenting. And his favorite thing to experiment with was liquid. After inventing his own fizzy drink, he wondered what it would taste like FROZEN. He called it an Ep-sicle (using the beginning sounds of his last name). Eventually, as this invention became popular, the name changed to what we now call a POPSICLE! Do not miss the included experiments.
